## FOUNDATION FRIDAY




FOUNDATION FRIDAY is a day dedicated to highlighting the work of the Pennsylvania National Horse Show Foundation. This afternoon's performance will include two Therapeutic Riding Championship classes for qualified riders as well as the PNHS Foundation "Therapy Horse of the Year" award presentation.

The Pennsylvania National Horse Show Foundation is a 501(c)(3) organization established in 1999 for the purpose of supporting projects and programs which focus on the education and training of persons in equestrian endeavors. Goals include the support of therapeutic riding programs and the education of equestrian experience for safe and fun riding practices. Applications for grants are accepted throughout the year with action upon requests awarded in September.

### 2019 Therapy Horse of the Year



A 14 year old American Quarter Horse named "Bulletproof," spent most of his career in New York State giving lessons and showing on the hunter/jumper circuit. He has been very versatile performing his therapeutic duties with EquiTeam Support Services for the past 3 years, helping children, youth, families and Veterans. A visiting autism expert encouraged one of our non-verbal, autistic clients to push beyond the normal routine. Having a non-verbal autistic work without guidance is extremely difficult. Thanks to the amazing Bullet, this young lady can now saddle up, ride and un-saddle all on her own with no leaders or side-walkers!

Always the first choice of riders at EquiTeam, Bullet is also an integral part of the Equine Assisted Psychotherapy program, giving insurmountable support to veterans working through combat trauma as well as helping parents & children learn and build appropriate relationships. During a particularly memorable session, he quietly 'guarded' a miniature horse from another more aggressive horse in the paddock. He did so quietly with ears back giving a warning without any quick, hostile or combative movements. This helped clients identify how important it was to have a 'parent' (Bullet) that cares for and protects you from the 'bad man' (the aggressive horse).

Bullet and the whole crew at EquiTeam are proud to be the PA National Horse Show Foundation Therapy Horse of the Year because he is our Horse of the Year each and every day!

## Madden and Jiva Uncatchable in the \$36,000 1.45m Harrisburg

Returning to defend their 2018 title in the \$36,000 1.45m Harrisburg Sprint, Bezie Madden and Abigail Wexner's Jiva successfully outpaced their competitors at the Pennsylvania National Horse Show (PNHS).

Riding first of 20 in the order, Victoria Birdsall set the bar high with a speedy clear round of 54.39 seconds aboard Djumpsina SFN. Their time was quickly surpassed by Madden, riding fourth in the order. Her blistering time of 50.79 seconds proved uncatchable as the class continued.

"I went early, so I planned to just be a little on the attack," Madden said. "It was quite fast in the beginning and settled down a little at the end. I think there were a couple places someone could have nipped me doing one less stride somewhere, but she (Jiva) has a lot of natural foot speed so it carried over."

Repeating last year's victory in the \$36,000 1.45m Harrisburg Sprint, Madden and Jiva walked away with the winner's share of \$11,880 and the James V. Tanzole Family Perpetual Trophy.

"She's just a very good horse to have to try to win some speed classes," Madden said of the 10-year-old Belgian Warmblood mare. "She can do a little bit bigger than this as well, but she's a great horse to have. It's good to have a horse you can go fast with and have the confidence she'll leave all the fences up."



## Mändli and Galan S Soar to Victory in \$60,000 Pennsylvania Big Jump



After a thrilling jump-off in Thursday's \$60,000 Pennsylvania Big Jump, Switzerland's Beat Mändli won top honors with Grant Road Partners LLC's Galan S. Course designer Michel Vaillancourt set a challenging track at the Pennsylvania National Horse Show (PNHS), which saw just five out of 24 starters move on to the second round. Mändli came out on top with the only clear round in the jump-off.

"I think (Galan S) is the sweetest horse I've ever ridden," Mändli said of the 13-year-old Belgian Warmblood. "He's so nice. Honestly, he's like a kid. He really wants to please. He doesn't try to do anything wrong. He always tries his best, and I think that's the best part apart from his ability to clear the jumps and do what we ask."

Bezie Madden, straight off a win in the \$36,000 1.45m Harrisburg Sprint, was first in the ring for the jump-off aboard Abigail Wexner's Coach. They lowered a rail on the fourth fence, and the next two competitors misjudged the turn to the second obstacle. Mändli posted the first clear round, setting the pace at 37.59 seconds with one rider remaining. He took home the \$19,800 winner's share of the prize money and the Second Cannabis Challenge Trophy.

"I went near the end so that was an advantage for me. The other ones made some mistakes here and there so I could slow down a bit," Mändli said. "(Galan S) is jumping (in the grand prix Saturday) and he has another two weeks ahead of him. He's going to Washington (International Horse Show) and we're practicing a little bit for that. ... We're trying to move him up this year."

Marilyn Little and Karen O'Connor's Clearwater were the final pair to jump off. They were quick across the ground but misjudged the first element of the double combination. Although they had the fastest time (34.32 seconds), a jumping penalty placed them second.

"My horse sprouted wings and somehow managed to jump out of the combination," Little said of the 12-year-old Holsteiner. "I thought I'd just go a touch wider (in the turn to the double) and I just lost the rhythm for a second and the distance got away from me and got really long. He reached for it and made it work. What a good boy. ... I think the world of him. He tries to win on the best nights, and he will save you on the worst."



The Show Jumping Hall of Fame and Museum, formally opened in 1989, was organized to promote the sport of show jumping and to immortalize the legends of the men, women and horses who have made great contributions to the sport. The focus of this noble institution is to encourage broader interest and participation in show jumping, as

well as to educate devoted equestrians and novice horse lovers alike, by sharing the sport's legends, lore and landmark achievements. Enshrinement in the Show Jumping Hall of Fame is a great honor bestowed upon those few whose contributions to the sport have set them apart. 
